Dear Mrs. Mussig,

Thank you for your letter of December 24 and your interest in the Warren Commission Report. I was pleased to hear from you regarding this matter.

As you know, I served on the Warren Commission and signed the report. It seemed to me at the time that the conclusions of the Commission, based on all available evidence, were sound. If, however, new and material evidence is found it should be presented to the proper authorities, such as the Attorney General of the United States, for evaluation.

You may remember that last year the Columbia Broadcasting System made four reports on the work of the Commission. I think these were very well done and answered many questions which were being raised by critics of the Warren Commission. These reports by C. B. S. combined with other reports which have appeared in various newspapers and magazines generally support the work and conclusions of the Warren Commission.

As you know, many libraries have a set of the 26 volumes of hearings and exhibits published by the Commission if you would like to examine them. To date, I have seen no new evidence which would cause me to question any of the conclusions reached by the Commission.
