ment as a means of extorting from the president what he cannot do the American way, with a vote of the Congress that is then subject to the veto of the third of our co-equal branches of government, the president. This is because the Gingriches do not have the votes to override the veto.

Mr. Thompson says the "mantra" of the Democrats is "if we could just spend more money." Here, more recent history is outside Mr. Thompson's ken.

When Ronald Reagan was elected with promises that we keep hearing from some Republicans, the national debt, accumulated throughout all of our history by all the presidents before Reagan, was only a third of what he, personally, added to the national debt.

And that with the resistance of the Democrats. who did succeed in holding back his unprecedented spending of public money that continued under George Bush.

Yet, despite this and probably having swallowed that line about "Tax and Spend Democrats" when the Republicans were doing just that, Mr. Thompson says that those he refers to as "the old lefties," who really are those who believe in our system as created by the founding fathers, not the extremists who seek to change that, "can finish out their lives unable to inflict the economic damage upon the rest of us" that he says they dream of.

Startling parallels to the 193 ariar
