Except for my hour and a half of early-morning walking that is more resting, when I skimmed the papers, and for a few minutes for a sandwich at lunch, I did this. And the farther I got into it the more I realized that it presents a real and a special possibility if the case is as solid as I think it is. ^{demand for a} Congressional investigation. With what precedes it, too. I'll try to find time to learn who chairs oversight but I have a notion that those who took up a date about a month ago might be helpful.

I'll not try to read this today. I confabulate too much with a time interval to risk more of it without a little lapse in time.

I hope that you and/or Graf will have the time to at least skim this and see for yourselves what the potential is. Can be, that is.

I'm enclosing copies of the documents I use not because I think you ^{u/} might have any doubts but because Herman does not know me. If it should be decided to use any, these are not my originals but are copies of copies of them. Those that have FBI file numbers on them make retrieval of the originals possible without any real search.

I hope to read and correct this in the ~~morning~~ Morning. ^{without starting} I hope that a third day shortly after midnight. I may write a bit more about it then.
