To The Editor:

It is now 13 years since the double murders of John Kennedy and Lee Oswald. Thirteen years and one Warren Commission later we still lack the true facts surrounding their deaths. Who cares you say? Why probe this mystery further?

If one believes in truth and justice, the JFK assassination must be investigated as was never done by the Warren Commission.
