WASHINGTON, Feb. 23—The FBI is investigating allegations that Lee Harvey Oswald plotted with others in New Orleans to kill President John F. Kennedy.

FBI agents have kept careully abreast of the investigaion of New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison into the lleged plot.

Although the FBI declined comment, it was learned that to date no hard evidence of a genuine plot has been developed either by the federal sleuths or by Garrison's investigators.

The death of David W. Ferrie, who had called the Garrison probe a "big joke"; the com-ments of a one-time private investigator named David F. Lewis, 26, who has spoken of a "conspiracy," and the activities of a Cuban exile, Bernardo Torres, 36, who contends he has information on the plot all have come under federal scrutiny.

GARRISON has refused a uggestion by Rep. Gerald R. Ford (R., Mich.), a member of he Warren Commission, to give is information directly to the ustice Department. Garrison

THERE HAS BEEN speculation in New Orleans that Ferrie was to have provided a getaway plane for Oswald in Dallas but this, too, was studied three years ago by the FBI and Warren Commission..

Answering Libeler's question-Answering Libeler's questioning in April, 196b, O'Sullivan said he went to a New Orleans airport to look at Ferrie's plane shortly after the assessination. shortly after the assassination.

much harder to make the connections between certain peo-ple. But I'm sure we'll make them anyway.

"I'm just as optimistic today as I was two days ago."

Two days ago, Garrison was insisting that his effort to prove a conspiracy in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy will result in arrests and convictions.

The President was shot in Dallas, Texas, Nov. 22, 1963. Garrison insists that a conspiracy to murder him was conceived in New Orleans.

GARRISON SAID his office had planned to take Ferrie into custody early next week, Because Ferrie had expressed fears for his life, Garrison said he provided him a temporary hideout at a motor hotel here.

"Evidence developed by our office had long since confirmed that he was involved in events culminating in the assassina-tion of President Kennedy," Garrison said.

The nude body of Ferrie, who operated a flying service here, was found in the calm posture of sleep, covered to the chest by a bedsheet.

His second-floor apartment was in disarray and disorder. An American flag was in the living room. Although 15 bottles of various pills were on a table, the coroner said no drugs weer found other wan wose used for vascular disease.

He said Ferrie was born with a weak blood vessel at the base of his brain. It ruptured, producing a massive cerebral hemorrage, Chetta said. Ferrie also suffered from high blood pressure and recently told a friend he had encephalitis (sleeping sickness).

DR. CHETTA SAID the time of Ferrie's death had to be be-fore 4 A. M. yesterday because of the rigor mortis condition. However, a Washington newsman, George Lardner, said he had visited with Ferrie in his apartment until that hour.

Although Garrison said he considered Ferrie's death a suicide, he added, "I am not rul-ing out murder. I'm not ruling out anything. We have gone far beyond the point of the War-ren Commission. We have made progress in three months with a handful of men than the Warren Commission with 3,000 men made in three years.'

Ferrie was described in sympathetic tones by Garrison as a man who had suffered private pain and was tortured by his appearance. He had lost his hair and eyebrows in an explosion several years ago, Garrison said. He did not reveal the details. Ferrie wore a shaggy toupee and mascara eyebrows.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio,

Ferrie resided in New Orleans the last 15 years. In 1961, he lost his job as an airline pilot after being arrested on a morals charge in suburban New Orleans. He was never

tried on the charge.
