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D.C. Clairvoyant Claims Space Tragedy Sabotage

Apollo Deaths Due to Foul Play—Jeanne Dixon

Mrs. Jeanne Dixon — the Washington, D. C., businesswoman who claims to see visions of the future — said in New Orleans Saturday that the recent Apollo space tragedy was the result of sabotage.

A guest speaker at a luncheon opening the 32nd International Marketing Congress in the Roosevelt Hotel, Mrs. Dixon told a press conference afterwards that she foresaw the space tragedy one month before it happened. Three American astronauts were killed in that tragedy when their Apollo space capsule was consumed in flames on Jan. 27.

Mrs. Dixon said she received a vision about the tragedy on Dec. 20, 1966. The vision, she said, indicated that sabotage by another country would be responsible for the incident. Asked what country, she said "common sense tells us who wants to slow down the American space program."

During her luncheon speech, Mrs. Dixon intrigued her audience with a few of her latest forecasts:

—The United States eventually will become bogged down in a Middle East war similar to the one in Vietnam, although not immediately. She said a solution to the current crisis will emerge within the next 90 days and with Russia the clear victor in the propaganda arena. She predicted a few scattered clashes between Israel and her Arab neighbors, but not a major war.

—Bloodier battles are in the offing in Vietnam, with no end in sight.

—Russia will send aloft a space satellite ringed with missiles.

—Russian submarines will be discovered off the coast of Venezuela, and Cuba will be overrun with thousands of Russian soldiers in a deliberate

campaign to subvert Latin America.

—The Russians will challenge Western Europe with a ring of missiles along the Carpathian Mountain range.

—Despite the present seeming intransigency, Russia eventually will become allied with the United States against Red China and the militant colored peoples of the world.

Mrs. Dixon, who was the subject of a recent best-selling book "A Gift of Prophecy," reminded her audience that she predicted the assassination of President Kennedy years before it happened, and tried in vain to keep the President from making that fateful trip to Dallas in November, 1963.

Questioned about District Attorney Jim Garrison's assassination probe here, Mrs. Dixon noted that Garrison was on the "right track" and was probably

touching on matters which were classified by the Warren Commission as "confidential" in the interest of national security.

The Warren Commission investigated Kennedy's death and has been attacked by Garrison as being in error that Lee Harvey Oswald alone killed Kennedy.

Mrs. Dixon, who operates a real estate office in the nation's capital, claims her visions of the future are the will of God. "His ways are mysterious and our faith in His will will sustain us through the many tragedies that lie ahead," she declared.

Her vision of the assassination occurred on Aug. 18, 1962 when she saw the White House under a black cloud. The vision also indicated that the Presi-

dent to be assassinated would be the one elected in 1960, she said.

In a later effort to convey her fears to the White House, Mrs. Dixon said she asked a friend of President Kennedy to persuade him not to make a trip to the Southwest in 1963. The effort was in vain, she stated.

Mrs. Dixon said she will be returning to New Orleans on Sept. 18 for an appearance at a local sales marketing executives meeting in the Municipal Auditorium.

The International Marketing Congress is a five-day global meeting being conducted by Sales and Marketing Executives International, a professional society of 26,000 members in 47 nations. More than 750 delegates from 30 states and six foreign nations are expected to attend the event which continues through Wednesday.

Authorities in government, business and education from the U. S. and abroad will be featured, including Walter H. John-

son Jr., executive vice-president of Interpublic, Inc., New York City, and president of SME-International.

On tap for Sunday will be the presentation of the Mexican Businessman of the Year Award to Rodolfo Patron Tenorio, chairman of Adhesivos Resistol in Mexico City.

There will also be a parade down Canal st., starting at 5 p. m., to herald the opening of the global congress. Business sessions get underway Monday and continues through Wednesday.
