## DA May Gain High Prestige, Governor Says

BATON ROUGE — Gov. John
J. McKeithen says that District
Attorney Jim Garrison will
reap tremendous prestige internationally if he proves his
conspiracy charges in the assassination of President Kennedy.

The Louisiana chief executive told a news conference yester-day that he did not believe the Orleans district attorney is politically motivated in the case that has stirred worldwide attention.

M'KEITHEN said he has been in touch with Garrison about the situation, but did not want to comment on the possible outcome.

He said he certainly did not want to criticize Garrison "because he has a habit of criticizing back."
