Aiten was informed that there would be no objection but that Liaison Agent could not see that purpose would be a rved since he already has the answers to the questions. Aiken said that if his superiors felt this was necessary, we would receive a formal request.

Following the raising of the above questions, Aiken apologized for asking these questions, peinting out that since he was assigned the responsibility of investigating this matter and since Liaison Agent had obtained a copy of the psychiatric evaluation of Garrison, he had to make this inquiry.

Chicker JII Fift of the had, during the Aiken thereupon volunteered that he had, during the Course of his investigation, interviewed Freeburg of the "Chicago Tribune" who wrote the article concerning the poychiatric evaluation, as well as District Attoiney Garrison. Aiken said that Freeburg admitted nothing during his interview with him and would not go under oath. Aiken also volunteered that Carrison mentioned several individuals whom he thought man have leaked this matter to the press, specifying Bill Corvich, a former investigator for Garrison. Garrison also informed Aiken that he felt the CIA might have been responsible for this leak: According to Aiken, Garrison discounted the FBI as being the source of this leak stating that there was no reason why the FBI would make the leak.

Aiken also volunteered that he was going to recommend to his superiors in the Inspector General's office that this investigation be discontinued on the basis that Army has more to lose than to gain by continuing the investigation.
