

Suit Against Garrison Survives Court Test

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 24 (UPI)—
The Fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled today that the estate of businessman Clay Shaw can seek damages from one-time District Attorney Jim Garrison for trying to link Shaw to the 1963 assassination of John F. Kennedy.

A three-judge appeals court held that even though Shaw died before his suit against Garrison was tried, the estate could pursue the suit under federal common law.

Shaw, a retired trade expert, was charged in 1967 with conspiring with Lee Harvey Oswald and others to assassinate Kennedy. Garrison claimed that the Warren Commission report on the Kennedy slaying was a fraud, and disputed its finding that Oswald was the lone assassin. Shaw was acquitted in 1969, after a 40-day trial, by a jury that deliberated just 55 minutes.
