RE: SURVEILLANCE OF 3330 LOUISIANA AVENUE - RESIDENCE
OF WILLIAM D. FERRIE ON FEBRUARY 8, 1967

On February 5, 1967, arrangements were made by Assistant District Attorney JAMES ALCOCK with a MR. WISH residing at 3331 Louisiana Avenue to use his address for a continuous surveillance of the residence of WILLIAM DAVID FERRIE located at 3330 Louisiana Avenue, upper apartment.

The surveillance began at 8:20 P. M. by JAMES ALCOCK and LOUIS IVON. The front door of FERRIE'S home is made of glass panels with no curtain on them. This gives officers a clear view of his front room with the use of binoculars. Officers observed WILLIAM FERRIE in his upper apartment wearing a long sleeve dress shirt with nothing under it. WILLIAM FERRIE appeared to be an extremely nervous person who would continuously walk from one side of the room to the other. It appeared to officers that between the arch in the front room and dining room that Ferrie either had a mattress on the floor or a pillow which he would sit upon for a few minutes then get up and walk around the front room then over to the left side of the room and lie down on a couch.

At 9:22 P.M. the next door neighbor arrived home and officers observed WILLIAM FERRIE peeping through the window at them. He did this for a few minutes, then he would walk around the room. At different times he would go back to the side window and peep out as if he could see in his neighbor's home.

At 12:07 A. M. on February 8, 1966, officers observed WILLIAM FERRIE turn out the room lights leaving only a lamp light on, and it appeared that he was retiring for the night. At this point the surveillance was discontinued for the night.
