will result. Garrison rejected a sugges. tion from Rep. Gerald R. Ford, R.Mich., in Washington, that he give his information to the U.S. attorney general, who could pass it on to President Johnson. "I am running this investiga-tion, not the President. not the

tion, not the President, not the attorney general," said Garri-

son. "We are investigating a con-spiracy which appeared to have occurred in New Orleans and they don't have a thing in the uney don't nave a thing in the world to do with it. Now, if they want to help me, I'll wel-come their help. But I'm not reporting to anybody." Garrison, 44, said involvement with federal officers would slow his investigation

with federal officers would slow his investigation. The controversial district at-torney is out to prove that a con-spiracy conceived here "cul-minated, in the assassination of "President John F. Kennedy in Dallas Nov. 22, 1963. There is no question he said

There is no question, he said, that others besides Lee Harvey Oswald-a former New Orleans resident-were involved in the conspiracy.

This goes counter to the Warren Commission, which said its exhaustive investigation showed that Oswald shot the president and that there was no credible evidence that anyone else was

lished a story on the investigation.

In Miami, Cuban exile Ber-In Miami, Curoan exile Ber-nardo Torres, 32, who helped the Secret Service guard Presi-dent Kennedy in Miami four days before the assassination, said he has been helping Garri-son and beliaves the Warren Report will be proved incom-pleta plete.

Torres said Garrison engaged him to look into the background of some Cubans reported to have been with Oswald shortly before the shooting in Dallas. He declined to discuss reports

that some exiles, angry at Kennedy's decision to stay out of further involvement in Cuba's Bay of Pigs, were talking about killing the President.
