Gets $12,000-$ Vote Major-
ity in DA's Race

District Attorney Jim Garrison, rolling up nearly 85,000 votes, scored a smashing victory over three opponents in complete but unofficial returns from Saturday's Orleans Parish first Democratic primary.

Garris on tallied 84,992 votes. He outdistanced former assistant United States attorney Harry Connick by ketter than 24,000 votes, and spreadeagled the field by mors than 12,000 votes.

Orleans Parish voters also gave overwhelming approval to urban renewal for the Lower Ninth Ward, marking the first urban renewal project in the history of New Orleans. A total of 70,929 people voted for urban renewal, while 20,960 voted against it.

In another significant special election, it became certain that the state Legislature will have its second Negro member in recent history, either Theodore J. Marchand or Earl J. Amedee from District 26. They will face each other in a Dec. 13 runoff election.

Another race forced into a runoff is for the office of parish coroner. Incumbent Dr. Carl Rabin and former top assistant, Dr. Ignacio Medina Jr., will square off for the spot. Dr. Medina, though without any endorsements save from many of the city's doctors, edged out Dr. Frapk E. Minyard for the second berth behind Dr. Rabin.

Certainly one of the interester observers of the DA's race was Clay L. Shaw, acquitted las spring of a charge brought by DA Garrison of conspiring ts kill the late President John F Kennedy, but later chargec with perjury by Garrison in the same trial.
Shaw was noncommitta: about his opinion of the voters verdict to return Garrison to office. "I am not going to make any comment on the election," said Shaw, contacted at his home. "There seems to be no point in it at this time."
Garrison revealed early Sunday morning at his headquarters that because of a slipped disc condition in his back he must undergo an operation or be placed in traction for a num. ber of days.
