

Supreme Court Refuses Review of Gaston Case

The Supreme Court today refused to review the conviction of Edward Page Gaston, who was sentenced to 90 days in jail and fined \$150 in Municipal Court here on a charge of unlawfully wearing the uniform of an Army captain.

The action of the Supreme Court leaves the decision of the lower court in effect.

Neilson Suspends Sentence In Army Uniform Case

Judge George D. Neilson today suspended the 90-day sentence of Edward Page Gaston, 76, found guilty of illegally wearing an Army uniform and placed him on probation for a year. Gaston was sentenced on May 5, 1943, to 90 days in jail and \$150 fine by Judge Neilson.

Gaston appealed the case to the Municipal Court of Appeals and Federal Court of Appeals, both of which upheld the lower court's decision. The Supreme Court denied a writ of certiorari.

Gaston was alleged to have worn a New York National Guard captain's uniform at the National Press Club on November 14, 1942, although, according to the FBI, Gaston had been honorably discharged from the outfit.
