

Synopsis:

LEE HARVEY OSWALD reinterviewed by Bureau Agents on 8/16/62, and stated contact made with Soviet Embassy, Washington, D.C., for purpose of notifying Embassy of Oswald's current address. OSWALD has established separate residence, and is currently employed as a machinist at Fort Worth, Texas. OSWALD stated upon arriving in Soviet Union, and prior to his departure, was advised by representatives of KGB, a Soviet police organization; however, continues to deny contact with "KGB" with wife or any other representative of the Soviet Union. OSWALD continues to decline to explain why he went to Soviet Union in the first instance, stating he considers it "his own business." OSWALD agreed to report to FBI any information concerning contacts or attempted contacts by Soviets with his wife or children. Background information on OSWALD reported. OSWALD and wife unknown to confidential informants.

Following investigation was conducted by SA JAMES P. HOSTY, JR.

On July 12, 1962, MR. JEFF WOOLSON, Supervisory Clerk, INS, Dallas, Texas, made available their file A18880043 on MR. and MRS. NIKOLAEVNA OSWALD, nee PRYKHODOVA. This file reflects that MRS. OSWALD was born July 17, 1941, in Severodvinsk (Formerly Molot, Arkhangelskaya District, USSR. She was destined for her husband,

LEE HARVEY OSWALD, 7028 Northwest, Fort Worth, Texas. The person furnishing the affidavit of support for MRS. OSWALD was BYRON PHILLIPS of Vernon, Wilbarger County, Texas (no street address given). PHILLIPS furnished an affidavit of support on March 15, 1962. MRS. OSWALD listed her occupation as pharmacist.

This file contains a U. S. Report on the Soviet service birth certificate of JOHN LEE OSWALD, which was recorded on May 2, 1962, at the U. S. Embassy, Minsk, USSR, by LEE HARVEY OSWALD, son of [unclear], born February 16, 1939, at Minsk, USSR.

JOSEPH B. WATSON, U. S. Consul, was the recording official.

MRS. OSWALD was issued an Admission Visa No. 12, issued May 24, 1962, at U. S. Embassy, Minsk, USSR, and was issued under U. S. Passport No. 11 [unclear] at Newark, NJ, on June 11, 1962, January 11, 1962, and [unclear] U. S. at New York City June 13, 1962, at [unclear].

These records reflect the subjects were [unclear] April 30, 1962. This immigration file contains a copy of [unclear] OSWALD attached to her immigration visa, a copy of [unclear] obtained if desired.

On August 24, 1964, [?], J. E. OSWALD, 7513 Rawsonport Street, advised his brother, [?], LEE HARVEY OSWALD, and finally had moved to an apartment on Mercedes Street, house number unknown to ROBERT; however, he volunteered that particular street is only about two blocks in length, and his brother could easily be located. MR. OSWALD also advised his brother, [?], had recently come to work as a machinist for a certain [?] in White Settlement Village, but MR. OSWALD stated he did not have the name or address of this concern.

Inquiries conducted in the vicinity of the 1700 block of Mercedes Street on August 25, 1964, revealed LEE HARVEY OSWALD was residing at 2703 Mercedes Street, Fort Worth.

Date August 23, 1962

JOHN EDWARD OSWALD, reinterviewed near his residence, 2703 Mercedes Street, Fort Worth, Texas, stated he has resided at this address since about the middle of July, 1962 with his wife, MARINA, and daughter, JOHN LEE OSWALD. He stated he has been employed as machinist for LEWIS'S Meat and Fish, 290-E North Tarrant (White Settlement Village), Fort Worth, since about July 15, 1962.

OSWALD stated contact had been made by letter with the Soviet Embassy in Washington, D.C., to advise the Embassy of his wife's current address, saying this is something that is required by Soviet law. He stated she would continue to make reports periodically to the Soviet Embassy in instances where they moved to another address.

OSWALD advised the matter of his having been given an undesirable discharge on August 17, 1960, from the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve by reason of witnesses has not been resolved, and, he did not know when the matter would be heard.

OSWALD volunteered he had never enjoyed his service in the U. S. Marine Corps. He also stated he had not enjoyed his trip to the Soviet Union any more than he had enjoyed his service in the U. S. Marine Corps.

OSWALD stated positively no individual had made any contact with him since his arrival in Fort Worth in the interest of the Soviet Union.

OSWALD denied he had on October 31, 1960, or any other time, requested his U. S. citizenship be revoked. He denied he ever took any steps to apply for Soviet citizenship. He advised he never at any time affirmed allegiance to the Soviet Union, and indicated a willingness to do so.

OSWALD advised when he first arrived in the Soviet Union, and also when he wanted to leave, he was interviewed by representatives of the KGB, which he characterized as being the secret police, who, for the most part handle criminal matters among the population generally. He stated their operation is wide-spread. He denied he ever made any "deals" with the KGB, and stated he was never asked to undertake anything or do anything for them.

He advised no reports were made to the Soviet Union, the U.S., or any intelligence agency of the fact that he attempted to speak him in any way. He stated that the Soviet Union was attempted to elicit any report information concerning the United States or its defense from him.

OSWALD denied that the Soviets at any time he would make available to them any information concerning his U. S. Marine Corps speciality.

OSWALD advised that on 10/18, 1963, he knew a fearful name resembles might be to the Soviet Union for having on the trip to the Soviet Union. He stated that the American Embassy in Moscow, during the trip, would be local of Americans. He stated the Embassy was not aware of any evidence which would warrant imprisonment of him, and he returned to the United States. In this connection, the American Embassy tried to persuade him to return to the United States alone, and without his wife, MARIA. He stated the Embassy is could not do that.

The Embassy, he stated, stated that it would be a difficult matter to get him and his wife, as he was a Russian. He stated that he advised him to go back alone, find a job, get a passport, and then come back. OSWALD stated he refused to return to the U.S. He told the American Embassy he feared he would never see his wife again if he left her in Russia. OSWALD stated he finally decided to return to the U.S. in the interest of his wife and children, and eventually returned. OSWALD stated he was his wife's only and only sponsor.

OSWALD advised that he had contact with his half brother, JOHN EDWARD PIC, who is a U.S. citizen, and he said as he knows, PIC is still in the U.S.

OSWALD advised that he was born in the Soviet Union in about five years before he was with his wife and her relatives. He stated that he would have been related to this and.

OSWALD advised that he was for questioning whether he went to the Soviet Union in the first instance. He stated he considers it "policy's business" that he wanted to go to the Soviet Union. OSWALD finally stated he went over to Russia on his "own personal reasons." He said it was a "remarkable" to him. He said "I went, and I came back." He also said "It is something that I did."

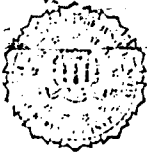
