

MISS HEARST SEARCH PRESSED IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 9 (UPI)—The Federal Bureau of Investigation said today that it was intensifying its search around Chicago on the chance that at least one of the fugitives in the Patricia Hearst case was hiding in this area.

Richard G. Held, special agent in charge of the Chicago office, said that William Harris, one of the principals in the Hearst case, might have fled to Chicago from Centralia, Ill., where Mr. Harris was reported hitchhiking with a female companion on June 25.

The hitchhikers were detained by Centralia policemen but released after they showed Social Security cards identifying them as Michael Andrews and Mary Hensley, names used in the past by Mr. Harris and his wife, Emily.

The F.B.I. said that the search here had been intensified "because of the sighting in Centralia."

An F.B.I. poster released yesterday contains three photographs of Mr. Harris and included information that he might be in the Chicago area.

Miss Hearst has been seen with the Harrises at least once since she was kidnapped Feb. 4, 1974, the F.B.I. said.

Mrs. Harris is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Schwartz, who live in Clarendon Hills, just west of Chicago.
