Dear Mr. Gavin,

The format of my unprinted books is pretty distinctive. They are xeroxed single spaced on legal-sized paper and side-stapled. From your letter of the 23rd I am led to believe you may not have received it. Against this contingency and because I cannot afford the xeroxing, I did insure it. Therefore, when next I am at the post office, I will ask them to trace it.

In the event it did reach you and somehow was lost, do not feel responsible.

I am also sorry you are unaware of the contents, for this book establishes perjury and worse with respect to the autopsy. There was official misrepresentation of the location and nature of the wounds. It also establishes what pictures and X-rays of the autopsy no longer exist, incredible as this may seem, all accompanied by minolithic official silence.

Should you like to read this, my shortest book to date, I will send you another copy.

Meanwhile, among the things I have gotten into my possession since our last exchange of letters is a receipt for the burning of top-secret evidence. I also have originals where the copies were altered. If this seems impossible in our country, with our government, remember my invitation to show you any of this evidence you would care to see.

If the insurance receipt will help trace this book through your files, a copy is enclosed.


