

Federal Jury Indicts U. S.-German League As Nazi Agents' Front With Conspiracy to Spread Propaganda.

Attorney General Biddle announced a Federal grand jury at Newark, N. J., returned an indictment today charging the German-American Vocational League, Inc., a subsidiary and 27 officers and members with illegally conspiring to act as Nazi agents without proper notification to the United States Government.

The Attorney General said the return of the indictment climaxed "one of the most complex and widespread investigations undertaken by the Federal Bureau of Investigation."

The German American Vocational League, Mr. Biddle said, has headquarters in New York and branches in Rochester, Newark, Philadelphia, Detroit, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Louis, Kansas City, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle.

Spread Propaganda.

The indictment charged that the league, under direction of the German Reich, "served the interests of the same by making use of its local

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chapters for the purpose of spreading and disseminating the propaganda issued by the government of the German Reich."

The principal objective of this propaganda, the Government charged, was to obtain acceptance of National Socialism in the United States and to prevent American participation in the war.

Mr. Biddle said the indictment set out alleged relationship between the league and the National Socialist Workers party in Germany from January, 1933, to January, 1942, the period of the alleged conspiracy.

The defendants were accused of conspiring to violate the Notification Act by acting as agents of a foreign government without prior notice to the Secretary of State and with violating the Foreign Agents Registration Act by failing to register properly with the Justice Department.

\$10,000 Fine Possible.

Penalties provided under the conspiracy statute are imprisonment for not more than two years or a fine of not to exceed \$10,000, or both.

The Justice Department said three of the individuals named in the indictment were in Germany and 24 in the United States. Of those in this country, one was in the Army, one in jail, two interned, three excluded from the West Coast by the Army and 17 at liberty.

Mr. Biddle announced the following were named in the indictment:

German-American Vocational League, Inc., also known as DAB (Deutsch-Amerikanische Berufsgemeinschaft), described as directly affiliated with the German Labor Front.

DAB Recreational Resort, Inc., New York corporation owned by DAB and consisting of Camp Bergwald at Pompton Lakes, N. J.

Fritz Schroeder, New York, national leader of DAB and president of Recreational Resort, Inc.

Fred Buttig, former national leader of DAB, now in Germany.

Joseph Lieblein, New York, vice president, treasurer and youth leader of DAB, whom the Just-
