In my most recent radio interview (2/13/92) I went out of my way to use Lane as an example of one of the most irresponsible critics. I felt compelled to write Erwin Knoll not only because of the Progressive's lack of attention to responsible criticism of the government's handling of the investigation of the assassination, but also because I did have an opportunity to attend a lecture Knoll gave in 1979 at Southern Illinois Univ. on the general topic of militarism. I was impressed with him. I will certainly let you know if I get any response.

The main reason I am writing again so soon is to let you know how my public lecture at the college went. I have enclosed the nicely-designed flyer that the students made and put up around campus. I was very gratified by this effort, and I put a fair amount of time into the 25-page lecture I delivered. It attracted about 100 people, mostly students, but there were a few faculty memebers there and some of the night security people sat in.
