PD, etc. He notes that the FBI in particular had much more interest in King, and although Malcolm X was under surveillance and they may have helped exacerbate his rift with the Black Muslims, it is entirely far-fetched and unsupported to argue that the FBI (CIA or other govt. agency) was involved in his death. The blame there rests squarely on the Nation of Islam, and their campaign of hate and death threats.
