Dear Trent,

I returned from California Firstay night. Yesterday morning my wife fall in the course of hending buckets of water to me to fight a grass fire that had storted. She sprained her enkle badly. K-rays and medical examination show the ligements are all badly torn. Indications are it is worse than a break. Of course, I took her to the hospital as soon as the fire was out. Her leg is in a cast. She is not able to walk on it. Tomorrow afternoon I take herm to the doctor again. Ferhaps I'll know more then.

However, I am writing you includedly in the hope that someone by whom I can mail this comes to visit. Icannot leave to do it. If no one does, I'll mail this on the way to the doctor, to give you the earliest po sible notice.

There is no likelihood at all that I can be in New York 2/26. Until I get the probabilities from the doctor, essuming that this soon he can offer an opinion, I think it best that we essume Islso will not be able to leave by 3/4. If it turns out that I can, I'll let you know impediately.

By this time I presume you have begun to make some arrangements, hence my haste. Possibly you can get someone else to takeny place for thisone.

There is no one I can leave withay wife, and I think it will not be possible toleave her alone. Particularly is this true because we are in the middle of a drought. Fiving in a wooded area, the hazard is greater. We had a close call on the fire.

There issue alternative I can suggest. If you cannot get anyone else to replace me, I can do this by phone. I believe you said you were going to have someone else on the program with me. I have done this for hours by radio and TV, and I think there may be added interest of a kind if my part and the answer ing of questions were by phone. The actual cost will undoubtedly be less than transportation.

If I get any medical opinion that is contrary to this, I'll let you know immediately. Except when I have my wife to the doctor, I'll be home, for there is the accumulation of three weeks to face and all tust she used to dofor me and the daily burden of newletters and shipments.
