I hope this letter finds you much improved healthwise. I just wrote takks to inform you of my change of address in case you have any other material ready for publication.

Have you ever considered checking into the Downtown Lincoln-Mercury aspect of the JFK case? A lot of the main characters seem to turn up there quite often. Phil Willis was employed there, as was Albert Guy Bogard. "Oswald" was supposed to have visited there, and it appears that other references are made to the establishment as "a downtown automobile dealership", etc. Also, Penn Jones (I know--I know) stated that one of the employees, Jack Lawrence, moved to Dallas shortly before the assassination. He became "ill" on the morning of the 22, and borrowed a car to drive himself home. He returnto work the afternoon of the shooting, his health much improv ed, but he didn't bring the car he borrowed. Another employee fetched the car and drove it back to the Downtown Lincoln-Mercury. It had been parked in the lot behind the fence atop the "grassy knoll". Lawrence left Dallas a few days after the assassination.

I know you don't put much credence into what Penn says, but there does appear to be a lot of "coincidences" surrounding Downtown Lincoln-Mercury jx in the days just prior to, during and just after the assassination. If most of the shooting originated from the knoll, then why was Phil Willis endeavoring to distract the Dallas Police from the area of the knoll, and imploring them to "seal off" the Texas School Book Depository Building? He was Ex-Air Force where he had been stationed in the far east, where a lot of CIA shenanigans had taken place. Anyway, I just thought that it might deserve investigation by some competent interested party. What do you think? Some sort of Safe house?
