I've read the Tane piece. St. George has the same dragons. When I know the fact, I cannot recognize it in his writing. However, some of the names are interesting. I've no time to check it out, but I imagine Humphreys is in Youngblood.

I can't visualize a CIA unable to turn Pops Doc out any time it wants to, nor can I conceive of its depending upon that wierd assortment of malcontents, frustrated, would-be soldiers of "fortune", professionally-qualified incompetents and just plain nuts for this kind of job. I got the same kind of noise from Hemming and Howard (taped) 10/68 and was unwilling to believe it first-hand (hence never transcribed tapes).

The rest is typical overwriting and effluvia, like what he considers a responsible and dependable source. Bringuier would undoubtedly meet his definition. Or Masferrer (real cool there). No part of the GBS story is there, or of the indictments of some of his more solid citizens, of the murder in a Florida camp, of the gasoline bombing, of the landing on the British isle, etc. In short, shit.
