HALL'S MEMORY IS 'REFRESHED'

Has New Information for Garrison, He Says

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (AP) — A California bartender sought in the Kennedy assassination probe of New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison says he has "other information which Garrison might use" about a meeting one month before the November 1963 shooting of the President.

Loren E. Hall also told a news conference that he won't fight extradition from California to New Orleans.

He explained that he has "refreshed" his memory after meeting with Edgar E. Bradley, 49.

Hall and Bradley, accused by Garrison of conspiracy in the murder, are scheduled to appear at an extradition hearing June 5 in Sacramento. Hall said three attempts have been made on his life since his name was made public by Garrison.

Hall said he saw Bradley during a meeting in San Fernando in November 1963 and heard casual talk about "getting rid" of Kennedy. Hall said Bradley was not part of the discussion.

The meeting was at a private home, he said, to raise funds to equip guerrillas with arms for an invasion of Cuba. He said some "anti-Jewish and anti-Negro radicals" attended the gathering.

However, Bradley told newsmen that he does not recall meeting Hall. "I will take a lie detector test on this," Bradley said. "This is an absolute false statement. It is interesting that Hall would come up with a statement like this. He was obviously well coached and doing it for an ulterior motive."
