

# not detailed to Morrison

CHICAGO, June 26 (AP) — James Earl Ray's attorney, Johnnie E. Cochran Jr., said today that the federal judge in Chicago who is presiding over the trial of the man charged with the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. has refused to allow the judge to see the evidence against Ray.

A court observer close to the trial said CHICAGO TODAY that the judge's refusal to see the evidence "makes it impossible to see what part of the trial."

It gives answers to questions Morrison and other attorneys asked, but that is all. The judge will describe the evidence, but doesn't say how it will be held up or proved.

"John told what the court ordered him to do, but the defense didn't get what it wanted," he said.

The long bill of particulars tells about certain "police men, reportedly throwing away their discharged shells, going off duty after a December 1968 trial in which two Black Panthers died."
