
Dear Mr. Morgan:

Thank you for your letter supporting my efforts in exposing CIA involvement in Chile and calling to my attention your belief in CIA involvement in the assassination of President Kennedy.

While the Warren Commission left certain questions unanswered, I still believe that its major conclusions have been successfully documented. All evidence of possible CIA involvement in the assassination is highly circumstantial, and simply does not carry enough weight to persuade me to disagree with the Warren Commission. As for former Chief Justice Warren hiding information, my belief in his integrity and the integrity of the other members of the Commission persuades me that if he had indeed discovered a CIA conspiracy, he would not have hid this information.

A Congressional investigation of CIA involvement in President Kennedy's assassination is highly improbable. Unlike CIA involvement in Chile in which decisions were made by many of the same officials still in power and in which past decisions reflect the attitude of much of the Administration's current thinking in foreign policy, questions of CIA or any conspiratorial involvement in the Kennedy assassination are all historical in nature and not considered by many to be of the same pressing importance.
