were the then vice president at the time of the 1963 Dallas shooting, has been named to the newly created position of deputy director of the service. This means he will rank second only to Rowley in the organization.

Thomas L. Lem Johns, who had been special agent in charge of the presidential protective division, is succeeding by the presidential protective division, is elevated to the position of deputy assistant director in charge of those forces.

The changes mean that Hill, who was Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy's chief bodyguard in 1963, will succeed Johns as the top Secret Service agent in day-to-day contact with Mr. Johnson, and with the protective division, is selevated to the position of deputy assistant director in charge of those forces.
