They should reach you before this letter does. The postmaster in the next town wss working overtime and the mall had not yet left on its tortuous way to Washing thon, so it is going out today. He said the p.0\% promises that any airmail sent special delivery from hare will be delivered some time the next day. Therefore I also sent it speciel delivery. I hope this time the word of the post office is good. It has not treated ray mail es most of us expect in 911 cyses.

While we were speakine my wife checked out files. The copy Cokesbury's had is a semple I sent then. They have never ordered fron us. $l_{t}$ is po sible for then or snyone else in Dalles wanting the book to get it from Paymar Book Co., Monrovia, Calif whodesalers with Texas customers. Individugls ordering from us send us $\$ 5.05$ including malling costs (no hendilne charge) ond we send the book the same day. (Ve dso flll wholessle orders the ssme day and at nomel trade discounts. hldrich had been ordering from us regularly. They nsy now be getting the book from Raymer.

The history of the book after its publication is an in piration bore in that it shows the great number of mericuns who do have deep feelings and go to the trouble of expressing them. We have received a tremonduous and gratifying einotional outpouring from poople from all parts of the country gnd all walks of liPe. It dertainly has helped in the toughar times, and it, still does, for we are still deep in debt. The printer has been true to the noble tredjtions of that erait, heving print with book knoving I was in dsot, without income and could give him nothing but my word and s borrowed $\{500$ down payment. is the money comes in from the sele of the book we give him $100 \%$ of the grosa, excent thet for ebouts month we heve men taking the postage fromit. rutil then ve also put out the postage to give him the entire gross. Dinday we finishad paying for the second printing end ordered the iourth, which Bhould be completed by the end of naxt week.

Wile the atritude of the press is changing, glovly but e.rtwinly, I still suffe the curse of the first. Redio has bean much more fair, mV less so, seve for individual stations. Of thern all, 1 have greatest respect fo the etromedia people, both radio and TV. WNEW-TV in New Yoxk has taped and will on NovemBer 12 syndicate $\varepsilon$ three hour spacial. Thay aired me for two hours the night of Jult $23-4$, fith a tremenduous respon They made no effort to censor or suppress, wore and heve been completely honorable and public-service minded.

I will be interested in your opinioc es a lawyer und 33 a lewyer who has read my book and "The Second Oswald", which I believe comes from mine ond I suspect in a manner not approved by the law. I can trace quotations and foctrotes, aside from ©ontent. I find thet where I omitted part of the beginning end ending of testimony, excstiy the same worde there incluce nd onitted. hare I give inclusive references, to more than the eited testimony, thet it also does, and where I recerred to only parts, thet it does do. I have found a case where I by accidont omitted the third of three pages that I should have referred to only to find thet, too, in this book.

I am surprised to find my name and that of others ussd for comgercial purposes on its cover without my permission - indeed, without even being osked. This is not in any sense a review, nor was its original form, a story in the New York Reviei, It is presented as an origingl work, yet in the 60 peges I have read it hes nothing importsnt not in my book end hast credited to mas book. The "noisy and tendentious" you quoted you will soon be in a position to evaluathe for yourself. I find a remsrable coincidence between the alleged author's oppearance in Jurope and the use oi this combination of words, used by none other of whom I am aware, in the London Sundey imes.

Among those who have ben helpful and friendly since they leerned about my book are a young lawyer in the New York araa and a business sxecutive in thet city. They are talking about establishine a foundation to continue my rork, something I would ind gratifying. There is also talk of it winding up in an archive in a major university. I think there should be an unofficiel one, and I would hop. it could include the work of others. But for this eventuslity I an keeping all my notes and correspondence.

The sequel which I mentioned briefly does not duplicat l Witervash. It goes further, addine deteils not hen eveilsble ond, I think, telling exactly how the whitewesh was occomplished.

Hay I ask if you are in a position to end willing to check certain things for me in Dallos. I onticipate this mey present oeftain hrizards to you, because the things in which I am interested may csuse certsin peopla to worry gbout my purposes and the knowledge I hsve thet oould lesd to such questions. This includes the records of arrests and the disposition of cases. The authorities will likely und ristend the purpose of such inquiry. Before you enswar and instinctively reply in the aflimative, plesse think this over, for there has been a stronge upsetting of the scturrial tables in in your area, and I do not want to further load then:

Abe there ozhers like you who roy be wiling to look into other things to which I oen refer you? I think I know where thare is much fresh and irrefute ble evidence. I can only conjecture whet it might reveel and its examinetion would be ime-consuming. I cen refer you to considerable motion-picture tootage, for example, unused, and some still pictures taat may or nay not still exist and eny or may not be available if they do. There are meny oven $l$ eds in Dalles. The question in my mind is would those following them survive it.

In any event, thank you very much for your call and aspecially for its purpose.
