If you will look at the bottom of page 56 of what I gave you when I was in New York, you will know who has asked me to ghost a book. I have not said that I would or that I would not; I have said that I would help.

At this point, I don't know what this person could say that could be proven true. I do know he can make the most serious charges against prominent people and, to a large degree, I can support them with what I now have. My purpose in writing is to see if Ron would find this so unpalatable he would refuse sight unseen. Were I in his position, I might; therefore, I ask. He has this manuscript with him so I send a copy of the letter for him.

I ask you both to treat this information with the utmost circumspection because a certain amount of hazard is involved. Were I
to agree and if he does not by then change his mind, the only way
I could do it would be to turn out a very fast book for editing by
whoever might publish. I would support it with tape-recorded interviews and what I already have where the newspaper clippings alone
are quite extensive.

Without going further into it, which I shall for other reasons in any event, my offhand opinion is that this could be pretty good and rather commercial at the same time.
