FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT -
ATTILA OF PAUL L. KOCH

Reference is made to the letter of Thomas D. Harper,
Acting Assistant Attorney General, Office of Legal Counsel,
dated July 19, 1971.

Referenced letter contained an inquiry as to whether
any material had been deleted from pages 400 and 423 of the
Warren Commission Document 75 which have been published as
pages 400 and 423 of Commission Exhibit 1141. No material
is deleted from these pages prior to their publication by
the Commission.

Enclosed are two copies each of the aforementioned
pages as they appear in our files. The markings (asterisks,
underlinings and marginal notations) which appear on the
copies herewith are administrative markings which were added
to these pages at FBI Headquarters subsequent to the
preparation of the originals.

It may be noted that pages 400 and 423 of Commission
Document 75 were not recommended for release in our October 1,
1970, memorandum entitled "Five-Year Review of Warren Commission
Files," which was enclosed with our letter bearing the same
title and date, because those pages contain the identity
of sources of information the disclosure of which could limit
the use of them or similar sources in the future to the
detiment of the administration and enforcement of laws of
the United States. Accordingly, it was felt that these pages
should not be released in accordance with the guidelines
3 (A) and 3 (D) approved by the Honorable George Bundy, then
Special Assistant to the President, on April 19, 1965.
However, inasmuch as these pages have in fact been released by
the Commission, this position regarding the aforementioned
pages is no longer pertinent.

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Item 1, B, in the referenced letter requested a copy of page 2 of Commission Document C68. A copy of page 2 of Commission Document C68, the report of SA Dennis T. Shanahan regarding Leo Harvey Oswald, dated March 13, 1964, at Chicago, Illinois, is enclosed.

Release of this page has not been recommended in the past and is not now recommended because guideline 3 (B) mentioned above, specifically relates to pages such as this. This page contains information from confidential records of the FBI Office, Chicago, Illinois, which is to be produced only upon issuance of subpoena duces tecum.

Item 2 in the referenced letter states that Mr. Felt, in his appeal specifically asks about a record of a possible contact initiated by Carlos Quirgo with the FBI on August 13, 1963, concerning a handset of communist type given by Oswald on that day. Inquiry was made as to whether such a record exists. Files of our local offices contain no indication that any such record exists or that any such contact took place. However, in order to pursue this subject further, we have requested our New Orleans Office to advise whether it has any record of any such contact. The results of that inquiry will be furnished to you when received.

Item 3 in the referenced letter notes that our letter of January 4, 1971, to the Deputy Attorney General stated that the FBI has no record of any interview with Edward S. Butler other than that appearing on page 10 of Commission Document 201. A further search has been made of our records for a document containing the results of any other interview with James J. Connell Butler relating to Oswald, the assassination, or related matters. That review confirms our previous statement that there are no other reports of such interviews of Mr. Butler. There is no information to support Mr. Koch's speculation that the December 10, 1963, interview of Mr. Butler was a "supplemental interview." As indicated in our January 4, 1971, letter, details concerning Mr. Butler's conversation with Oswald on August 22, 1963, at Station WLOU in Lake Charles, Louisiana, are available in Commission Document 207, pages 520-530, and in the supplemental volumes of the Commission hearings. It is noted that in Commission Document 201,

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which Mr. Koch has, Mr. Butler is reported as saying that the August 21, 1963, contact with Oswald was the only one he had.

It remains our view, as previously stated, that the final decision as to public disclosure of material such as that discussed herein rests with the Department of Justice. Our views with regard to possible handling of requests from Mr. Koch were set out in our letters to the Deputy Attorney General dated July 1, 1970, and January 4, 1971. Except for the fact that the release of pages 400 and 426 of Commission Document 75 is no longer at issue, those views still pertain.

NOTE:

Paul L. Koch, Berkeley, California, "graduate student" has been making inquiries about the assassination of President Kennedy over the past five years. On 9/19/69 he wrote to the Attorney General alleging "some sort of relationship" between Lee Harvey Oswald and the FBI. The Director has noted "I dislike the hunting of a character like Koch who is obviously a 'smear' artist." Under the Freedom of Information Act, Koch has requested, among many others, the documents mentioned above. Reference letter states that Koch is appealing the Deputy Attorney General's 5/7/71 denial of Koch's 12/9/70 request for various documents. Reference letter requested certain additional information and copies of documents in order to dispose of Mr. Koch's appeal. Regardless of the fact that Seat of Government files contain no information to substantiate supposition that there may have been an interview of Carlos Quiroga on 8/16/63, in view of Koch's persistence it is deemed advisable to ask New Orleans to check its files on this point so we may nail it down securely. Inquiry being made of New Orleans by separate airmail. Department also asked for any comments to might wish to make on the disposition of this appeal. This letter reffers to our previous position that ultimate decision as to public disclosure rests with the Department of Justice and refers to prior letters in which we comment on Koch's inquiries regarding Quiroga and Butler.
