Referenced teletype on page 2 reveals information concerning a tape recording of a telephone conversation made February 18, 1964, by Mark Lane with one "Miss Hill," a Dallas woman who heard four to six shots.

Based on information furnished, "Miss Hill" cannot be identified in Bureau files. It is noted that Dallas report of SA Robert P. Gamberling, dated 11/30/63, page 35, reveals an interview with one Jean Hill, 9402 Bluff Creek, who may or may not be identical. Dallas is requested to identify and interview Hill if not previously conducted. For further information, it was noted in an issue of the "National Guardian" that one "Miss Hill," possibly identical to the individual who made the telephone tape recording, was described as a school teacher.

Dallas is requested to submit results of interview in a letterhead memorandum suitable for dissemination excluding the property stamp.

NOTE: This matter pertains to the "National Guardian"-sponsored meeting entitled "An Inquiry into the Oswald Case" which was held at the Town Hall, New York City 2/18/64 before approximately 1500 people. Mr. David Haber, Professor of Law, Rutgers University and former Law Clerk of Justice, Hugo Black, who was the chairman stated he was present because of the need for greater publicity in the Oswald case because of the aura of secrecy surrounding the case.

Mark Lane, volunteer defense lawyer for Lee Harvey Oswald, criticized investigation by the FBI and Secret Service. In his speech, he utilized affidavits alleged to have been secured from the Dallas District Attorney's Office and gave blackboard drawings furnishing 3 versions of how the President was shot attempting to prove that the first bullet could not have been fired by Oswald. Lane then played the tape recording of the telephone conversation made 2/18/63 with "Miss Hill." Based on information furnished, "Miss Hill" cannot be identified in Bureau files. /
