Hoover wrote that he had received scores of letters from "knowledgeable and concerned citizens" wanting to know whether the FBI had gone beyond its normal investigative role in the Kent case.

In a reply to Hoover's letter, Knight said he regretted the paper had used the word "conclude" instead of "report" but maintained the story was otherwise accurate.
