Dear Colonel Guild.

In your letter of Earch 25, in response to mine of Earch 14, you state that there are no records pertaining to the assessination of President Remady because all those provided to the House Select Condition on assessinations were "returned to Army control and are 'sealed and segregated' with the appropriate (air) record arcter at the request of the Clark, House of Representatives." You state what is not factually correct, that "Shey constitute the investigative files of a congrussional condition and/are therefore exampt from all provisions of the Freedom of Information and (FCTA)."

The records I requested are those of the Army, not the Congress, and the Army's records are not "exampt from all the provisions of" FOTA.

In fact my first request for those recerts was many years before there was any MSCA. I was then informed, quite inscentially, it now turns out, that all such files were described. If there is any prevision of FCIA or any other act that enables the army to protein that its records of more than a decade earlier because the records of the Congress, you do not eite it. If there is any such authority, I would approclass a copy. I have followed FCIA and its legislative history closely and I recall nothing like this. Quite the opposite, no record of the executive break is incree under FCIA unless it is within one of the nine beginlated exemptions.

If any of this were by any chance true, it would apply only to those copies provided to MENA. You can avoid dispute and possible littigation of this contrived issue by providing me with copies made from the Army's file copies rather than from the copies made for MENA and returned by it.

Perhaps the Clerk of the House can sequester the records of the House but until now I know of no approxy claring that he can sequester its records. The Department of Justice and the Fai have been and are disclosing records copies of which it also provided to HECA.

Dear Mr. Weisberg:

This is in response to your letter of 14 March 1981, requesting information concerning the assassination of President Kennedy, particularly to the autopsy and all surrounding evidence, under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act, 5 USC 552.

The record systems maintained by the Office of the Assistant Chief of Staff for Intelligence, Headquarters, Department of the Army (OACSI, HQDA) contain no information relative to your request. The OACSI, HQDA has been designated as the Executive Agency for any and all Army records (health, medical, personnel, intelligence and investigative) requested by the House Select Committee on Assassinations. The records provided to the committee have been returned to Army control and are "sealed and segregated" with the appropriate record system at the request of the Clerk, House of Representatives. They constitute the investigative files of a congressional committee and are therefore exempt from all provisions of the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA). It will be necessary for you to obtain written consent from the Congress before we can process the files under the provisions of the FOIA.

For your information, all of the proceedings of the House Select Committee on Assassinations have been sealed by the Archivist of the United States for a period of 50 years.

We regret that we are unable to be of further assistance in this matter.
