You also see that yourself (possibly) had you could have trusted "G. Martin" and now the FBI, Washington and Miami, did not figure out either who the unnamed reporter became was or that G. Martin was not a "he." Not that you are named. Or that Shirley was not the object of considerable FBI/Commission interest/frustration, not to mention news and late. They even sent out a CIA letter on the "Shirley" accurate web on her crystal ball, which of course was followed by a detailed "This is the exacting unorthodox communication we have received." ...the FBI then was out of the way.

There was much 3-179 attention but nothing you don't know or haven't seen. Alexander apparently had principles against ever being "paid" and did he stick to his principles?
