Hughes reportedly left his London hideaway hotel earlier in the week and moved into a hotel owned by another publicity-shy businessman.

On Dec. 7, a Bahamian mag-istrate refused to order fugitive financier Robert L. Vesco removed to the United States, ruling that a federal wire fraud charge was not an extraditable offense under a 1931 U.S.-Bahamas treaty.

Potential Potential legal action against Hughes may result from a grand jury investiga-tion under way in Las Vegas. Details of the probe are sketchy, but U.S. Attorney V. DeVoe Heaton has confirmed that the panel is looking into the acculsition of Air West an legal action the acquisition of Air West, an airline formed in 1968.

"There can be no sane reason to even think about any indictment of Mr. Hughes, Hannah said today. Asked about Hughes' whereabouts, Hannah said he could not be sure where Hughes went after leaving London although he is "likely to visit his interests in the Bahamas."
