

FINAL INCA EXPO EVENT IS TODAY

Several Service Awards to Be Presented

The Information Council of the Americas (INCA) exposition moves into its third and final day Saturday, with a full program of events highlighted by the presentation of several distinguished service awards.

Entitled INCA EXPO, the exposition is intended to celebrate INCA's 10th anniversary and call attention to its activities.

Founded by Dr. Alton Ochsner and several other New Orleanians, INCA is a non-profit organization aimed at promoting the free enterprise system and exposing Communistic activities in the Americas. Saturday's program will get underway at noon in the Audubon Park Tea Room. INCA EXPO is open to the public without charge.

According to Richard E. Warren, INCA executive director, one of the organization's current projects is a fund raising effort to collect money for the purchase of many transistor radios. Warren said the radios will be distributed through South and Central America where they will receive INCA anti-Communist broadcasts.

One of the highlights of Saturday's program will be a salute to the military by U.S. Rep. F. Edward Hebert. Rep. Hebert's address will follow the presentation of representatives from 10 Latin American countries.

In addition, Dr. Oschner will present a number of INCA awards for 1971.

According to Warren, the Golden Mike Award will be presented Patrick J. Frawley Jr.,

former board chairman of the Eversharp, Shick and Technicolor Corps. The award is presented annually to the "outstanding individual fighter for freedom."

The Educational Award will be presented to Johann Rush, president of the Cine Verte Co. of California for his drug documentary "A Journey into Time".
