Specifically, Edwards called is on newspapers and magazines to condemn the governments of Cuba and Haiti for their suppression of freedom of the press.

"We condemn the actions of these governments in the full knowledge that the men in gower are often representatives of the armed forces who seized scontrol in the sincere belief that they could serve their countries only in this way," said Edwards.

"They believe also with equal sincerity that they have a right r and a duty to select and censor 1 any information made available

to their fellow citizens.
"It is our duty equally to combat with all our strength this misguided claim to the pos-session of truth, which all his-tory has shown will lead to greater outrage and upheaval than any which these govern-ments were formed to pre-vent. . "
