



In 3/70 the Invaders had no headquarters address and maintained no bank account. LANCE WATSON, Prime Minister of the Invaders, attempted to organize a project called "Operation Breakfast" in the fall of 1969 but was hampered by a lack of funds. WATSON and 4 of his followers demonstrated at the Memphis PD in 2/70 protesting police brutality. In 2/70 WATSON indicated that he was attempting to reorganize the Invaders in an effort to make the organization more effective.

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DETAILS:

I. ORGANIZATION

A. Origin

A militant black nationalist group of young Memphis, Tennessee, Negroes, now known as Invaders, was originally formed in the summer and fall of 1967 by three Memphis Negroes, COBY VERNON SMITH, JOHN BURRELL SMITH, and CHARLES LAVERNE CABRAGE. During the fall of 1967 and spring of 1968, it

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assumed the name of Black Organizing Project (BOP), with subsidiary cells known as Afro-American Brotherhood (AAB) at Dwen College; Black Student Association (BSA) at Memphis State University; LeMoyne College Intercollegiate Chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (LIC, NAACP) at LeMoyne College; Invaders, primarily consisting of high school students and school dropouts; and City Organizers, consisting of young non-student adults; all having a combined average membership of about 100. The ostensible purpose was to create pride in black identity, to teach black culture and black history, and to obtain employment for young blacks.

B. Headquarters

As of December 10, 1969, the Invaders had no head-quarters address. LANCE WATSON, the leader of the Invaders, resided on a part-time basis at the residence of his grand-mother, 333 Webster, Memphis; part-time at the residence of his mother, 1709 South Parkway East, Memphis; and part-time at the Trumpet Motel, 380 South Second Street, Memphis. His main base of operations was at the home of his mother, 1709 South Parkway East, and most business matters concerning the Invaders were handled at the latter address.

As of March 20, 1970, LANCE WATSON, Prime Minister of the Invaders, resided at 1031 North Watkins, Apartment 3, Memphis, Tennessee, where most business matters concerning the Invaders are conducted.

II. ACTIVITIES

On December 16, 1969, LANCE WATSON and other members of the Invaders attended a meeting at 449 Patterson, Memphis, at which time they discussed possible candidates who are favorable to the black community in the Memphis area.

A meeting of the Invaders was held on December 30, 1969, at the Trumpet Motel, 380 South Second Street, Memphis. At this meeting a committee on police brutality was discussed and WATSON stated he intended to become a member of this committee.

On the evening of January 15, 1970, a memorial service was held in honor of Dr. Martin Lather King, Jr., at Ellis Auditorium, Memphis, Tennessee. LANCE WATSON and other members of the Invaders were observed at this meeting.

On January 15, 1970, CACHEATUH SMITH, a former member of the Invaders, was heard to comment that the Invaders is for all practical purposes a dead organization. SMITH stated that the organization exists in name only and is what LANCE WATSON says it is at a given time.

A meeting of the Invaders was held on February 9, 1970, at 1031 North Watkins, Apartment 3, Memphis. At this meeting a "trial" was held regarding LOUELLA JACKSON, who was believed by some of the members of being dishonest. After the trial they decided to use her only in workshop programs.

In mid-February, 1970, LANCE WATSON was heard to comment that he intended to reorganize the Invaders in order to make the organization more effective.

(ME T-1, 2/11/70)

A meeting of the Invaders was held on February 11, 1970, at 1031 North Watkins, Apartment 3, Kemphis. At this meeting a "rap session" was held at which time the members present discussed the history of the black race, sex, and ways in which the white man has tricked and used the black people. At this meeting WATSON stated he was going to reform the Invaders.
