

Deposition of Dr. Ronald Coy Jones, March 24, 1964, 6H51-57.

Questioning by Specter.

Dr. Jones is a resident physician in general surgery at Parkland. He saw the anterior neck wound (page 53) and described it "no greater than a quarter of an inch in greatest <sup>diameter...</sup> ~~diameter~~". He also stated that it was "just above the suprasternal notch". In his report at the time of the emergency he had said (6H55) of the neck wound, "thought to be a bullet entrance wound".

If it had been an exit "you would think that it exited at a very low velocity to produce no more damage than this had done..." It would be consistent "... with an exit wound" only if "a" very low velocity to the point that you might think that this bullet ~~barely~~ barely made it through the soft tissues and just enough to drop out of the skin on the opposite side." He sees as many as 4 or 5 bullet wounds a night. He also was rehearsed.
