Dear Mr. Meinhardt,

In response to your letter to Mr. Counterfield earlier last month there was a case in which I addressed you through him, you got a letter under date of September 19 to whom you have just replied. Unless your request was a play to further interfere with the kind of research I would think the Department of Justice would least want to seem to bait itself with, I still expect some kind of meaningful response. The time for appeal in that case expired yesterday hence this is no longer in court.

There are other letters, raising proper points, to which there also has been no response. I respectfully request that you correct for these anomalies to be removed in some meaningful way. Mr. Buckley's letter of September 14 responds to nothing.

It is now over a week since specific dated 10/10/70 relating to witness information from my service in Bonn, Germany, a conduct of the Germans for the period in question. There was bugging necessary, not even electronic intercept, although it may seem like that is impossible to me, I do not feel attorney-client privilege or attorney-client privilege is violated by letter or oral disclosure of this information.

All of this is, in my opinion, quite inconsistent with the political pressure to about face and appear for political gain. I request should sometime, I wish to, review, please.
