

FBI to Probe JFK Slaying Aspects

The Justice Department, after reviewing the 28-volume congressional report on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, said yesterday it would make a "limited" investigation of the killing.

Spokesman Robert Havel said the department wanted an independent acoustical test on a Dallas police tape that led lawmakers to say they think a second gunman may have been involved in the Kennedy shooting on Nov. 22, 1963.

The House Assassinations Committee report said Kennedy was "probably assassinated as the result of a conspiracy." That directly contradicts the conclusion of the Warren Commission, which in 1964 said Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone to kill Kennedy.

Rep. Louis Stokes, D-Ohio, the assassinations committee chairman, was sent a letter by Robert Keuch, special counsel to Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti, explaining what the department was planning.
