## Dear Harold:

I thought you might find the enclosed interesting if not disturbing. I will try to work on the Hall assistant information, but it may take some time.

I got a computer for my home about a month ago and I have checked into a newsgroup on JFK. Normally these aren't very enlightening, but it keeps me up on what they are talking about. A guy named McAdams seems to spend a lot of time on them. Once in a while someone who truly wants to know things comes along and I send them your address. You should have gotten an order or request for prices from one recently. Seemed like a nice fellow. He was interested in getting new copies of your books but didn't know where to get them.

I told you a while back that my grandmother's grandmother's grandfather was from the Frederick area, and took the Maryland Oath of Allegiance during the Revolution - apparently fought "on land and sea." He was drafted in the militia in Baltimore, and fought at Germantown and other places under a Captain Cox and General Smallwood. According to the land records, John Sluts (aka Slutts, Slutz) owned 72 acres near Libertyville (?) at a place known as "Stoney Spring." Apparently he had an inn and/or tavern on the premises, but no license to operate it. He moved to Ohio about 1803-05. It had been part of a tract known as "Middle Plantation" owned by George Streat. Any of this sound familiar? Maybe it was Liberty *Town*. I have copies of documents about the survey in 1787, and a resurvey done later.

School starts with students the day after Labor Day in my district. I have teachers' meetings Thursday and Friday of this week. I am not eager to get back, but I had a long and productive summer. I did get a lot of reading done again, finishing biographies on James Dean and Ernest Hemingway, reading some short stories, and now reading David Halberstam's *October 1964* about the Yankees and Cardinals that year.
