Miles Wolff, President of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, called together newspaper and broadcasting representatives to discuss it. The group was concerned enough to select a five-man steering committee to study the Warren Commission recommendations, but made it clear that the sense of the meeting was not at all apologetic: "Within forty-eight hours, the print and electronic media reported the Dallas Story so accurately and completely that the Warren Commission, in ten months and with unlimited resources, did not alter the basic outlines of what the media had reported."
