Kennedy's office yesterday p.m., telling her about book and contents in only general terms but making it specific that in my opinion it destryps all major conclusions of Report. Told her I asked nothing except preservation of confidence, although, naturally, I'd gladly accept what help I could get. Told her I was there then only because with possibility of plagiarism in France my hand was being forced, that I not longer had complete and unquestioned control over it, and that I thought, in addition to what should be obvious, Senator should know that a sensational treatment of certain aspects, such as functioning of D.J. when he was A.G., could be used to his detriment. Told her if they desired I'd bring a copy for them to Xerox, again with no strings except keeping confidence. Told her I was about to have it multilithed myself in order to get copyright. Senator has had a policy of disassociating himself from all such matters. If he has any further interest, they will be in touch with me.
