

## RFK Says He Wouldn't Reopen Warren Report

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sen. Robert Kennedy got a barrage of questions Monday on whether if elected president he would open the U.S. Archives to reveal details of the death of his brother, President Kennedy.

"I would not reopen the War-

ren Commission report." Kennedy told students at San Fernando Valley State College. "I have seen everything that's in there. I stand by the Warren Commission." He did not elaborate on whether he would open the archives.

Several times the senator, campaigning for the Democratic presidential nomination, tried to ignore the questions from students. He became obviously more distressed as they persisted. Finally he said, "Your manners overwhelm me."

"Go ahead," he said, "go ahead, ask your questions."

A student shouted, "Will you open the archives?"

Kennedy said, "Nobody is more interested than I in knowing who is responsible for the" —and there was a long pause— "death of President Kennedy."

Then he said he would not reopen the Warren report.

An aide said it was Kennedy's first public statement of this kind.

The Warren Commission report found that Lee Harvey Oswald alone assassinated President Kennedy.

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
