GUN PANEL MEETS ON KENNEDY CASE

Will Check Ballistics Data in 1966 Death of Senator SEP 8 4 1975

Special to The New York Times LOS ANGELES, Sept. 23— The seven firearms experts who will re-examine ballistics evidence in the Robert F. Kennedy assassination met here today for the first time.

They were introduced to the county's Board of Supervisors and inspected the court jury room in which each will con-duct separate tests. Then the panel began private discussions of procedures for the court-ordemed testing.

The panel is expected to choose one member as a "court administrator" to coordinate testing, act as a spokesman, decide what equipment they may need and prepare conclusions.

The panel's primary goal is to determine whether a second gun was fired in the Ambassador Hotel pantry the night of June 5, 1968, when Sirhan B. Sirhan shot the Senator. The re-examination was ordered Aug. 14 by Superior Court Judge Robert A. Wenke. Paul Schrade, who was injured in the shooting, and the CBS felevision network requested the order.

One Named by Sirhan

Each participant inth e re-examination—the Los Angeles County District Attorney's Office, Mr. Schrade, CBS, Mr. Sirhan the State Attorney General and the County Councilpicked one panel member. The seventh expert was agreed on by all parties.
