Ordinarily, after receiving the letter Miss Bessie Rogers wrote me
November 17 for Mrs. Abrex Mertin Luther king, Jr., I would have waited to near for
from you before writing. Mowever, " present Harold Jeisbgrg, a writer, of Route
8, Frederick, Md. On his beneff I will soon be filing a suit against the government in which - believe you will have interest, unless the government makes evailable
to Mr. Meisberg voluntarily what the Justice Jepartment has su pressed illegally
abd has written me it intends to attempt to continue suppressing.

Mr. Teisberg has completed a very large, detailed and highly persuasive study of this assessination and its official handling. With the exception of his work on the assessination of Tresident ennedy, it perhaps the largest such work ever done.

In the course of his work he has written a number of Dr. Aing's associates, not on of whom has responded. De did not write hrs. Ding because he believed it might be too painful to her. However, he is in possession of knowledge he would like those looking out for the family interest to be aware of. I am, therefore, writing you at his request to offer you access to his work in advance of the probable litigation, subject to but one restriction: you preserve his confidence and his litterary property.
