Dear Mr. Weisberg:

Enclosed herewith are 958 pages of abstracts encompassing sections 14 through 25 of the MURKIN file.

Excisions have been made in some abstracts and nineteen have been withheld in their entirety pursuant to one or more of the following subsections of Title 5, United States Code Section 552, as noted in the margins beside each deletion:

- (b)(1) information which is currently and properly classified pursuant to Executive Order 12065 in the interest of the national defense or foreign policy;
- (b)(3) information specifically exempted from disclosure by statute;
- (b)(6) materials contained in sensitive records such as personnel or medical files, the disclosure of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of personal privacy;
- (b)(7) investigatory records compiled for law enforcement purposes, the disclosure of which would: .
 - (C) constitute an unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of another person;

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(D) reveal the identity of an individual who has furnished information to the FBI under confidential circumstances or reveal information furnished only by such a person and not apparently known to the public or otherwise accessible to the FBI by overt means. いいが明

Exemption (b)(3) was cited pursuant to the National Security Act of 1947, and the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Act of 1949. Inasmuch as serials 44-38861-2404, 2440, and 2461 were referred to the CIA, the corresponding abstracts were processed to reflect the determination made by that agency.

If you so desire, you may appeal to the Associate Attorney General from any denial contained herein. Appeals should be directed in writing to the Associate Attorney General (Attention: Office of Privacy and Information Appeals), United States Department of Justice, Washington, D. C. 20530, within thirty days from receipt of this letter. The envelope and the letter should be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Appeal" or "Information Appeal."
