I am interested in learning whether someone else against whom I did not file and who was other than helpful - he withheld pertinent information from me - did this at the behest of his insurer. *or could have.*

If this does not present you with a conflict, I'd like to know how I may go about learning.

It was kind of you to try to be helpful when I'm sure you keep very busy. It has been my experience that as soon as lawyers learned my age they had no further interest at all.

The very first of the many firms I approached took the case, made a date for me to come in so they could take a statement and get what evidence I had and then, when a partner who was out of time returned and they all conferred, phoned to cancel the appointment. They were quite honest. They explained the economics as they saw it, were quite specific about it, and although I was quite disappointed, respect them for their honesty.

In this sense the statute does discriminate against the elderly, I think.

My experience makes me appreciate your willingness and your helpfulness even more and I thank you again for it.
