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## Berrigan Speaks For Brother

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—The Rev. Daniel Berrigan says he will ask a federal judge to speed up the sentencing of his brother, Philip, who was convicted of smuggling letters in and out of federal prison during the Harrisburg 7 trial.

Daniel Berrigan has scheduled a news conference for Monday to distribute letters appealing to U.S. District Judge R. Dixon Herman for action. The meeting with newsmen will take place at the federal building, where his brother, also a Catholic priest and six others were defendants in the Harrisburg 7 trial earlier this year.

Five of the seven were dismissed when the jury failed to reach a verdict on charges of conspiring to kidnap Presidential adviser Henry Kissinger, blow up heating tunnels in Washington, D.C., federal buildings and raid east coast draft office.

Philip Berrigan and Sister Elizabeth McAlister, a teaching nun from Tarrytown, N.Y., were convicted on the letter-smuggling charge.

J. Thomas Menaker, one of Philip Berrigan's attorneys, said the antiwar priest cannot be eligible for parole from a six-year sentence he's now serving, until the conspiracy case has been disposed of. Berrigan has served more than two years of his term, for destroying draft records.

Before Herman can fix sentence, he must rule on two key post-trial defense motions. Philip Berrigan wants the case dismissed on grounds the convictions for letter-smuggling were discriminatory, and that the government conducted illegal wiretapping.

Menaker said the judge told him he would rule in August.
