**Tax Relief?** 

Both presidential camps are furiously at work on tax pro-posals aimed at winning the support of the nation's aggrieved taxpayers.

George McGovern's advisers are talking privately about using tax credits to achieve a modest redistribution of income. They would like to shift some income from the top one-third to the lower two-thirds of the population by granting individual tax credits and taking it out of the taxes of the upper brackets.

The figure McGovern has in mind is a \$1,000 tax credit for each adult and a lesser amount for each child.

President Nixon, meanwhile, contemplating tax reforms İs of his own. Aides say he would like to reduce the tax burden on home owners. This would bring tax relief chiefly to the middle classes, who hold most

He is also seeking some way to ease the financial burden parents who send their children to private and parochial schools.

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
